

## Protecting our Wildlife: Responsible pet ownership

Around 70 per cent of Australian households have one or more pets - we value our companion animals. Our unique native animals are also widely valued, with some species kept as pets, but more often simply enjoyed in the wild and as welcome visitors to our gardens. The health of our environment relies on the harmonious interrelationship of all species within a given habitat. With good pet management and public awareness, the needs of domestic and native animals can both be met.

#### Responsible ownership is the key

Responsible pet ownership allows you to enjoy the presence of native birds and animals in your surroundings as well as your pet who provides you with companionship.

#### The impact of domestic pets on native wildlife

A wide variety of native animals, ranging from common species like possums, kangaroos, to threatened species such as bandicoots, koalas and quolls, may be at risk from domestic pets in urban areas.

Unchecked, dogs can harass and even kill native animals, while cats are instinctive hunters and are more likely to kill birds and lizards. Despite human owners meeting their pet's needs for food and shelter, instinctive hunting will continue.

#### What you can do

The responsibility for managing domestic animals rests with their owners. You can:

- Help reduce unwanted animals, many of which become strays and threaten native animals. If you can no longer look after your pet, find them a happy new home, or take them to the RSPCA. Report suspected cruelty of uncontrolled animals.
- Don't release animals into the bush as they may suffer needlessly and die or become feral and prey on native wildlife. Fish flushed down the toilet or released into local waterways can upset the natural balance and impact on native fish species.

Even returning native animals to the bush creates problems. Once native animals have been kept in captivity they may no longer know how to fend for themselves in the wild. Always seek guidance. Give sick and injured native animals to carer groups such as WIRES or call your local National Parks and Wildlife Service office for advice.

 Ensure that dogs are kept under control and on lead in reserves and bushland. Keep your dog in the backyard, particularly when you are not there. Walk your dog daily and properly train your dog to respond to your commands.

- Keep cats inside overnight-and particularly at dawn and dusk. Cats will prey on possums and other small native mammals at night, and birds at dawn and dusk when they are most active. It will reduce cat fights and the subsequent infection and disease, and reduces the risk of your cat being run over.
- Obtain and keep native pets legally. Many native species are not well suited to domestic life however, most states and territories allow some to be kept as pets under certain conditions. Check with your National Parks and Wildlife Service office.

Research the care needs of your native pet carefully to improve the chances of your pet's survival. Many species, such as reptiles, do not show their distress clearly and can die slowly in captivity. Alternatively, you could encourage native species to visit or live in your garden by planting suitable food and shelter species and having water available - you may find you may get even more pleasure from that.

## **Neville's Fishing Report**

Well, what a spell of wet weather we have experienced - not the usual Autumn or end of Summer one would expect.

Fishing was affected by the long dry spell but thankfully the rains have brought the first chain of the food supply entering the ocean from all estuaries along the coast. The impact of this is already being felt by the blue water and estuary anglers.

Snapper have been habiting the inshore reefs and the rocky headlands along with some excellent Morwong.

Sand Flathead have moved into the shallow sandy beach areas along the coast line and some good results are being boated. The Tiger Flathead seem to be hanging around the inner reef areas; these fellows will move a little wide of the reefs in search of shellfish prawns and smaller fish as a food source.

I suspect the usual run of Luderick (Blackfish) that we usually see in late March and April will not really eventuate until late April and early May. Water conditions in the estuaries should improve around this period.

There are some good Bream answering the call coming up to high tide in most of the local estuaries. Nipper bait is the recommended bait at this stage. There are still a few Whiting around using this bait as well.

Goodbye to the old Garfish until next spring. The odd flounder has wheedled its way to the dinner plate, these fellows are a delightful bonus and will often be picked up whilst fishing for Bream and Whiting.

I may make mention that there some surprises afoot for the Mighty BONANZA Fishing Competition this year. Rumour has it that it will be over three days: Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Because of the great support and sponsorship already secured, we are of the opinion that this will be the 2<sup>nd</sup> largest competition in the State - and it's likely to become the largest in the state next year. A marvellous effort by Adam Martin and his hard working committee.

Until the next edition, keep those rods held high and those lines tight. GOOD FISHING!
